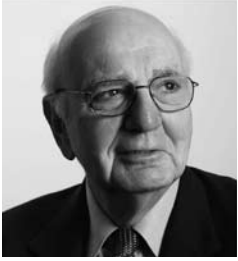

**Henry A. Kissinger** served as the 56th Secretary of State from 1973 until 1977, and as Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs from 1969 until 1975. He chaired President Reagan's National Bipartisan Commission on Central America from 1983 until 1985, and from 1984-1990 he served as a member of the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board. Dr. Kissinger was born in Fuerth, Germany, came to the United States in 1938 and was naturalized a United States citizen in 1943. He served in the Army from 1943 to 1946. He graduated summa cum laude from Harvard College in 1950 and received M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Harvard University in 1952 and 1954. At present, Dr. Kissinger is Chairman of Kissinger Associates, Inc., an international consulting firm. Among the awards he has received have been the Nobel Peace Prize in 1973; the Presidential Medal of Freedom (the nation's highest civilian award) in 1977; and the Medal of Liberty (given one time to ten foreign-born American leaders) in 1986. He is the author of 15 books and has published numerous articles on United States foreign policy, international affairs and diplomatic history.



**John C. Whitehead** began his professional career in 1947 at Goldman, Sachs & Co., where he worked for 38 years. He rose quickly within the company and was named Partner in 1956, and Co-Chairman and Senior Partner in 1976. In 1985, Mr. Whitehead was asked to become Deputy Secretary of State, and served in that capacity until January 1989. During this period he took a special interest in relations with Eastern Europe, the United Nations, and with various administrative reforms in the State Department, and was awarded the Presidential Citizens Medal by President Reagan. Mr. Whitehead graduated from Haverford College in 1943, served in the U.S. Navy during World War II and received his M.B.A. from Harvard in 1947. He is a former Chairman of The Federal Reserve Bank of New York, The Harvard Board of Overseers, The Asia Society, and International House, among many others. Mr. Whitehead served as Chairman of the Lower Manhattan Development Corp, the organization responsible for the rebuilding and revitalization of Lower Manhattan, from 2001 to 2006. He is also the Founding Chairman of the National September 11th Memorial and Museum at the World Trade Center.



**Paul A. Volcker** worked in the Federal Government for almost 30 years, culminating in two terms as Federal Reserve Chairman from 1979-1987 under Presidents Carter and Reagan. He divided the earlier stages of his career between the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, the US Treasury Department, and the Chase Manhattan Bank. Mr. Volcker retired as Chairman of Wolfensohn & Co. upon the merger of that firm with Bankers Trust in 1996. In 2003, he headed a private Commission on the Public Service recommending a sweeping overhaul of the organization and personnel practices of the Federal Government, and in 2004 he chaired the Independent Inquiry into the United Nations Oil-for-Food Program. In 2008 he was named by President Obama to head the President's Economic Recovery Advisory Board. Educated at Princeton, Harvard and the London School of Economics, Mr. Volcker has been associated with the International Accounting Standards Committee, the Japan Society, the Institute of International Economics, the American Assembly, and the American Council on Germany. He is Honorary Chairman of the Trilateral Commission and Professor Emeritus of International Economic Policy at Princeton University. He has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of International House since June, 1998.



**Fareed Zakaria** is editor of *Newsweek International*, a *Newsweek* and *Washington Post* columnist, weekly host for CNN, and a *New York Times* bestselling author. In 2007, *Foreign Policy* and *Prospect* magazines named him one of the 100 leading public intellectuals in the world. Since October 2000, Dr. Zakaria has overseen all of *Newsweek's* editions abroad, where his cover stories and columns reach more than 25 million readers each week. Prior to joining *Newsweek*, Dr. Zakaria served an eight-year term as managing editor of *Foreign Affairs*, a widely-circulated journal of international politics and economics. In 2008, he began hosting *Fareed Zakaria GPS*, a weekly foreign affairs program that airs Sundays worldwide on CNN. Dr. Zakaria's in-depth interviews with heads of state, intellectuals, business leaders, politicians and journalists have been broadcast in more than 200 million homes in over 210 countries. *The Post-American World*, which is Dr. Zakaria's most recent book, was a *New York Times* bestseller and has been translated into over 20 languages. Born in India, Dr. Zakaria received a B.A. from Yale College and a Ph.D. from Harvard University. He currently serves as a Trustee of Yale University and International House.

“One frosty morning I was going up the steps in front of the Columbia Library, when I met a Chinese student coming down. I said ‘Good Morning.’ As I passed on, I noticed out of the corner of my eye that he had stopped. So, I stopped, and went back to him. He said ‘Thank you for speaking to me; I have been in New York three weeks, and you are the first person who has spoken to me!’

“My wife and I decided to invite a small group of foreign students to our home . . . We soon became aware that, in front of our log fire, assisted by a cup of tea, a miracle was taking place. The fact that they came from several different countries lost its significance . . . They were just students—friendly, jovial, talkative.”
